MINUTES

Call to order of regular meeting

Old Business

Administrative and Community Program Updates

Administrative adjustments were made to internal documents, including personnel reassignments and name updates, with a commitment to send an updated packet to Jackie. A staff departure at year-end was communicated to the team.

A partnership between UA Chat and the Upper Arlington Library’s Tremont branch will distribute emergency preparedness kits to adults enrolled in home delivery services—specifically serving



homebound residents. The program's stated goal is to increase accessibility to preparedness supplies for residents unable to leave home. Each kit includes hygiene items, solar charging banks, flashlights, and tailored planning tips. Kits are being assembled Friday, with 30 slated for distribution via the home delivery program before the end of October; the remaining 50 kits will be stored and distributed upon request.

The transitional housing project is in its second cohort: 39 referrals were screened, and 34 clients enrolled. The program bridges clients into temporary housing, then permanent placement, with a first-month stipend, and connects participants to community health workers for transportation, employment, and food needs.

Community engagement: In quarter three, the Clinton Township Produce Market served 1,292 individuals from 385 households; 11 individuals from two households in zip codes 43220 or 43221 received fresh produce. The Creating Healthy Communities grant of \$100,000 was awarded, with funding running from October 1 through September 30, 2026. The health promotion team engaged 3,659 community members at 31 events; none were hosted in Upper Arlington, though UA residents may have attended.

Emergency preparedness and training: The emergency preparedness team participated in a BioWatch full-scale exercise that proceeded well. "Stop the Bleed" training reached 29 individuals in quarter three, none in Upper Arlington.

Vaccination outreach: Multiple measles vaccination clinics were conducted on-site at schools, supported by the mobile vaccination unit and three nurses from Columbus Public Health at the last school event; many children were vaccinated. A web request form was made available for vaccination requests, and the mobile unit visited several events.

Environmental Health Services Report

Environmental Health operations continued at full scope, with a noted change in the state XCELA system that removed breed information from animal incident records.

- Animal incidents: 7 in Upper Arlington.
- Pools: 14 inspections; standards were met unless specific follow-ups or complaints applied.
- Body art: 1 pre-opening inspection completed at Yen's Massage Studio.
- Food safety: 1 set of plans processed; 0 warning letters issued. Activity totals included 70 standard inspections, 1 complaint inspection, 2 follow-up inspections, 2 consultations, and 9 temporary inspections (event-based operations without general mobile licenses).
- Plumbing and medical gas: 226 inspections completed in Upper Arlington; detailed breakdown is currently unavailable due to configuration work in progress.
- Sustainability: 1 complaint investigated on Farley Drive, referred to appropriate partners.

An action is pending to produce and circulate the detailed breakdown of plumbing and medical gas inspections once system configuration allows.

Special Focus: West Nile Virus and Mosquito Control

WNV activity was significantly elevated across Upper Arlington this season, with high minimum infection rates in mosquito pools observed in all sub-areas (Upper Arlington Central, North, and South). Despite the intense vector activity, no residents of Upper Arlington have been



diagnosed with WNV. The current season is described as worse than a notably bad year about five years ago, and conditions have remained warm enough to prolong mosquito viability.

Mosquito control practices faced mounting constraints:

- Spray treatments: Annual spray treatments typically total about 149; this year they reached 376.
- “Do not spray” requests: These rose from 238 to 437. More broadly, the number of “no sprays” in some areas has increased from about 10–12 to hundreds, driven largely by pollinator protection concerns.
- Impact on studies and control effectiveness: High densities of “do not spray” zones have made area-wide spraying ineffective and potentially confounded outcomes in studies, such as an OSU pollinator study. The difficulty in communicating the preventive importance of mosquito spraying is contributing to an upward trend in “no sprays” across the county.

The team underscored both the public health implications of dense “do not spray” clusters and the operational challenges in producing reliable control outcomes and study data under these constraints.

Infectious Disease Surveillance and Vaccination

Substance use response:

- Naloxone doses distributed to first responders in quarter three: 812.
- Naloxone administered by EMS in Franklin County in quarter three: 560.

The speaker noted that several confounders (including availability and awareness) likely influence administration numbers, without drawing definitive conclusions.

Regulatory reporting:

- High administrative code rule changes include new items classified as Class B conditions, to be reported by the next business day.

Measles and vaccination:

- United States measles outbreaks in 2025: 42; 86% of confirmed cases were outbreak-associated.
- In 2024: 16 outbreaks; 69% outbreak-associated.
- MMR vaccination coverage is less than 90%, with heterogeneous coverage and pockets of unvaccinated individuals even in high-coverage states.
- Ongoing local investigation: A confirmed measles case in an unvaccinated student from New Albany Plain Local School District after international travel. Columbus Public Health and the district are notifying families, and an on-site vaccination clinic was conducted.
- Vaccination operations continue via on-site school clinics and mobile unit support, with an emphasis on reaching all eligible individuals.
- Exemption environment: Religious exemptions for child vaccination are described as very easy to obtain—“literally, you just write something in”—and recent Senate changes have reduced enforcement capabilities. This is regarded as a serious long-term risk to herd immunity.

Respiratory illness surveillance:

- Current viral activity levels: COVID-19 is moderate; flu is very low; RSV is very low.
- Trend signals: Flu low but increasing; RSV very low with no change; COVID low but increasing (based on emergency department care-seeking data, not population-wide).



- A respiratory health dashboard is said to be available on the Ohio Department of Health's website (www.osho.com), though the data summary relies on ED-based indicators.

Reportable diseases:

- Top reportable diseases (not specific to Upper Arlington): chlamydia and gonorrhea.
- In 2025, top reportable conditions for FCPH were COVID followed by STDs.
- Outbreak investigations in 2025: 115 total (68 confirmed, 28 probable, 19 suspected).
- Most vaccine-preventable disease outbreaks were institutional, with healthcare-associated as the next highest category.
- Institutional outbreak impact: 698 institutionalized individuals affected; leading issues were COVID-19, norovirus, and hand, foot, and mouth disease.

Public Swimming Pools –

Franklin County Public Health (FCPH) currently licenses 398 recreational water facilities for the licensing year spanning June 1, 2025, to May 31, 2026. Within the City of Upper Arlington, there are 23 licensed pools, spas, or special-use pools. As part of its regulatory oversight, FCPH conducts standard pool inspections at least twice per licensing year. Additionally, annual pool equipment inventory inspections are performed to document essential components, including pool pumps, filters, chemical feeders, drain covers, and other facility-specific equipment. During this quarter, 5 inspections were conducted in Upper Arlington at the locations listed below.

Body Art –

Franklin County Public Health (FCPH) currently licenses 96 body art facilities for the licensing period of January 1, 2025, through December 31, 2025. Licensed body art services include traditional tattooing and body piercing, as well as permanent makeup and reconstructive procedures such as microblading, micro-needling, scalp micropigmentation, and scar camouflage. In the City of Upper Arlington, FCPH licenses three tattoo establishments, all of which offer permanent makeup and/or reconstructive procedures. As part of its regulatory oversight, FCPH conducts inspections of body art facilities at least once per licensing period. During the Third quarter of 2025, one body art inspection was completed, as detailed below.

Vector Control

Mosquitoes Trapped and Tested

Over 150 traps are set throughout Franklin County each week. Upper Arlington is divided into three zones which are listed in the tables below with total mosquitos collected for West Nile Virus (WNV) testing. The numbers in the table reflect only female mosquitos. This is because only female mosquitos bite and are capable of transmitting WNV. As mosquitos test positive for WNV, the area is treated to reduce the number of adult mosquitos.

2025 was a record-breaking year for mosquito-borne illnesses in Franklin County and across the state. The rate of infection with West Nile Virus in the mosquito population was higher in 2025 than in any year previously, and abundance of *Culex* mosquitoes was significantly higher than the 10-year average. Statewide, human cases of both West Nile Virus and La Crosse Virus were well above long-term averages.

Administration Services

- The Franklin County Overdose Fatality Review (OFR) Committee met 11 times in 2025, reviewed a total of 15 fatality cases, and developed one new recommendation in 2025. Trends noticed across all reviewed cases and informed by aggregate death data over the course of the year, included older adults, fentanyl use (usually in combination with other non-opioid drugs), deaths involving xylazine, disproportionate death rates for African American men, and anecdotal data regarding adverse childhood experiences for decedents. Additionally, Hispanic men are experiencing an increase in overdose deaths. Hispanic individuals and immigrants from other ethnic backgrounds can be at higher risk for overdose due to a lack of connectedness to community resources and cultural stigma related to mental health and substance use treatment. The Franklin County OFR developed a new recommendation to support immigrant populations through providing overdose prevention education and resources to trusted community leaders or culturally-focused agencies.
- The OFR Coordinator also developed a prevention and adverse childhood experiences presentation to share with school mental health staff for Gahanna-Jefferson public schools in September. This presentation focused on warning signs, protective factors, and risk factors associated with youth substance use. In 2026, the Franklin County OFR hopes to edit this presentation to share with you at the county's charter schools.
- In 2025, the Community Action Group (CAG) was formed as a community-based subcommittee of the OFR. The CAG is supported by 5 paid individuals, who have lived or living experience with substance use and 15 individuals who represent different community agencies that provide harm reduction or substance use treatment services to Franklin County residents.
- Notable projects included developing two prevention-focused educational handouts and creating the curriculum and supporting materials for Restoring Communities Through Action. Restoring Communities Through Action is a 4-part educational series that discusses stigma reduction, harm reduction, treatment resources, and ongoing recovery support. The series is tailored to meet the needs of people experiencing substance use disorder or their family/loved ones, however, it is general enough to share with all community members to increase acceptance of treatment and supportive services for people who use drugs. Restoring Communities Through Action was presented to men who are incarcerated at Franklin County's James A. Karnes Corrections Center. 16 men joined the cohort and 8 finished all 4 sessions. Post-test knowledge check scores improved, but not every person who took the pre-test also took the post test, so the results are not conclusive. 100% (n=8) of respondents said that agree or strongly agree that they can identify resources to support treatment, harm reduction, or long-term recovery and can address stigma.

Behavioral Health and Addiction Services

- In Quarter 4, 4 naloxone kits were distributed to residents of zip codes 43220 and 43221. There were no naloxone community trainings conducted in zip codes 43220 or 43221.
- 391 naloxone doses administered by Ohio EMS in Franklin County in Q4 2025 ([Ohio EMS Naloxone Watch](#))



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- There were 2 naloxone doses administered by Ohio EMS in zip code 43220 and 43221 in Q4 2025
- According to preliminary data as of 12/22/25, 728 naloxone kits have been distributed in the community in December. Not all data for this month has been reported as of this date, so this number is likely to increase.
- There were Recorded 309 known overdose reversals with naloxone kits distributed. This number relies on individuals returning for future services and self-reporting reversals, so the true number of reversals is likely higher.
- Franklin County CARES is a surveillance platform that offers access to local data on community health indicators, overdose, addiction, and other social and medical factors. Visit the [Upper Arlington Community Profile](#) for more information.
- The recent collaboration agreement with the Franklin County Public Defender's office has been finalized. This collaboration will enable Peer Support staff to offer Peer Support Services to clients who are looking for assistance in attaining success in their recovery journey

Care Coordination

- CC CHWs served 7 residents in Quarter 4 from zip codes 43220 and 43221 and completed 27 one-on-one checklist visits to provide ongoing care coordination. Pathways - (15 initiated/10 completed) 8 Learning Pathways completed; 3 Social Service Referrals initiated and 1 completed; 2 Medical Home Pathways initiated; 1 Medical Referral completed; 1 Pregnancy Pathway initiated.
- Initiated and completed pathways are a testament to the work of CHWs, who spend each day in the field cultivating relationships with Franklin County residents to improve access to care and quality of life. CC CHWs initiated 7,986 pathways in 2025 and completed over 89%, with some highlights below:
 - Provided 5,119 individual educations
 - Initiated 1,540 Social Service Referral pathways and completed 72%
 - Initiated 744 Medical Referral pathways and completed 78%
 - Initiated 140 Housing pathways and completed 48% by connecting 68 residents to long-term housing.
- The Transitional Housing Program successfully launched two cohorts of program participants in 2025 through funding from Franklin County Department of Job and Family Services and Franklin County Office of Justice Policy and Programs. The program has three major components, as each program participant and their family are connected to a CHW, a Relocation Housing Specialist, and provided temporary housing for up to 90 nights. A few 2025 program accomplishments are listed below:
 - FCPH received 113 referrals for Franklin County Residents and their families to be enrolled into the Transitional Housing Program
 - Of the 113 referrals, 100 participants (88%) were connected and successfully enrolled with a CHW.
 - A total of 97 participants and their families were placed into temporary housing
 - Of the 100 participants enrolled, 88 were connected to a Relocation Housing Specialist
 - In total, 39 participants and their families were placed into permanent housing across Franklin County. To view real time data and progress of the program, please follow the [Transitional Housing Dashboard link](#).

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Community Engagement - Health Promotion

- Health Promotion Team was awarded \$100,000.00 for the **FY26 Creating Healthy Communities Grant** to continue addressing policy, systems, and environmental change strategies to improve healthy food access and opportunities for active living in Franklin County. This funding will begin on October 1, 2025, through September 30, 2026.
- In Quarter 4, the Clinton Township Produce Market provided fresh produce to 1,838 individuals from 557 households. Of those residents provided with fresh produce no one reported their residential zip code as 43220 or 43221, it is possible residents of Upper Arlington may have been provided with fresh produce.
- The HSP Health Promotion team engaged with 1,525 community members through 26 different community events. These events included community training and education events and health fairs. One of these events were held in zip code 43220/43221, engaging with 15 community members.

Community Engagement - Emergency Preparedness

- The Emergency Preparedness team holds and participates in many county-level planning efforts that impact residents of Upper Arlington.
- The Emergency Preparedness (EP) Committee held a Zombie Apocalypse Tabletop Exercise (TTX) [featured on the news!](#) on October 30th. The TTX simulated a zombie outbreak, teaching FCPH personnel how Regional Drop Sites (RDS) and Points of Dispensing (POD) operate.
- The team trained 34 individuals in Stop the Bleed in Quarter 4. While none of the individuals being trained reported being a resident of Upper Arlington a Stop the Bleed training can be requested at any time by following this [link](#).

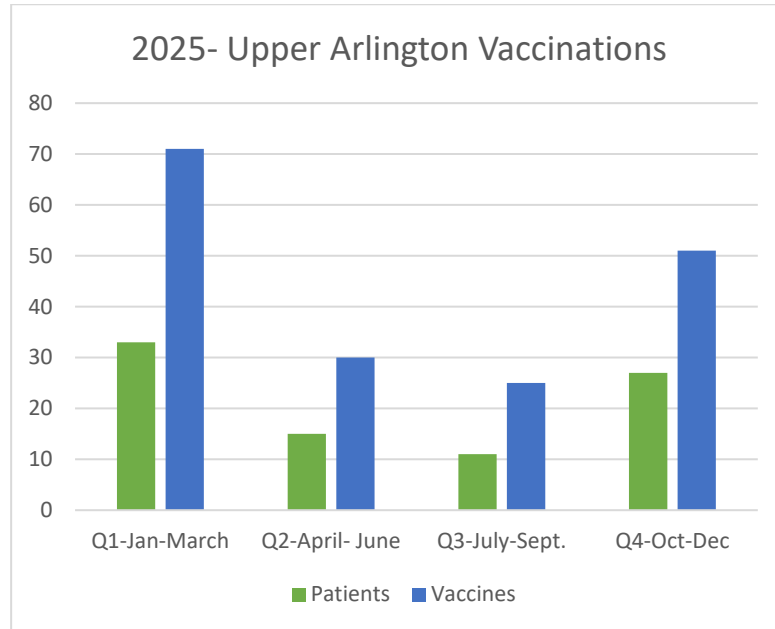
Upper Arlington CHAT Updates

- **Leadership Transition:** Katy Oberle has concluded her tenure as CHAT Co-Chair. Jen Downing, an active CHAT member and UA Public Library professional, has assumed the role alongside Christine Leyshon.
- **Community Outreach:** CHAT submitted health-focused "News Bites" to the City of UA's *Insight* Newsletter, covering topics such as cervical cancer, heart health, colorectal cancer, healthy food access, and stress management.
- **Collaborative Engagement:** The CHAT Coordinator attended the UA Network meeting to connect with local organizations and coordinate participation in outreach events to share health information and resources.
- **Upcoming Event:** CHAT will participate in the UA Public Library's Community Health Fair on March 7, featuring an interactive Healthy Eating Education activity using the Smoothie Bike.



Upper Arlington Immunization Data

From October 1, 2025, to December 31, 2025, a total of 27 patients from Upper Arlington received 51 vaccinations at FCPH's routine childhood and adult vaccination clinics. Among these vaccines, 7 were updated COVID-19 vaccines.



Upper Arlington Maternal and Child Health Data

From October 1, 2025, to December 31, 2025, public health nurses provided comprehensive case management services to 124 families of children with complex medical conditions residing in Upper Arlington.



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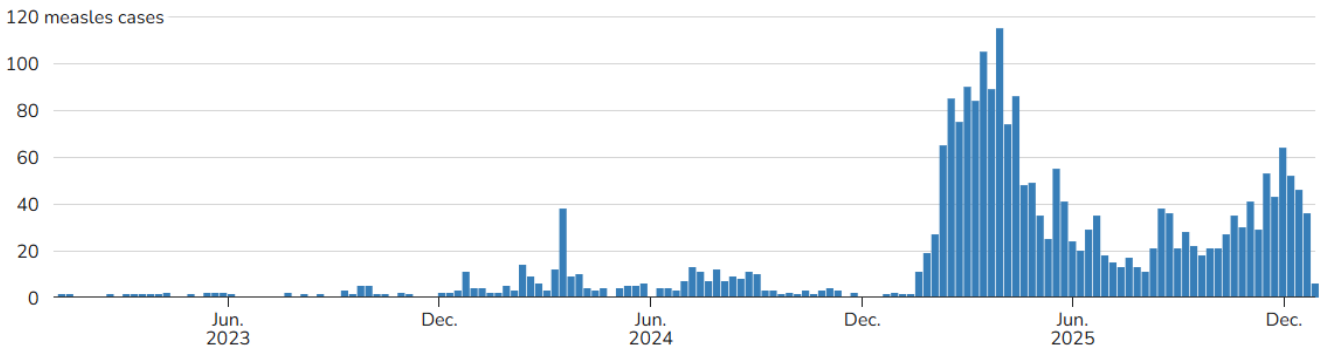

Measles Update

As of December 30, 2025, a total of 2,065 confirmed measles cases had been reported in the United States. These cases are across 44 jurisdictions, including Alabama, Alaska, Arizona, Arkansas, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Florida, Georgia, Hawaii, Idaho, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York City, New York State, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Carolina, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Utah, Vermont, Virginia, Washington, Wisconsin, and Wyoming. A total of 24 measles cases were reported among international visitors to the United States.

In 2025, there have been 49 reported outbreaks, with 88% of confirmed cases (1,820 of 2,065) associated with these outbreaks. For comparison, 2024 saw 16 outbreaks, with 69% of cases (198 of 285) linked to outbreak activity.

2023- 2025 Weekly Measles Cases by Rash Onset Date (As of December 30, 2025)

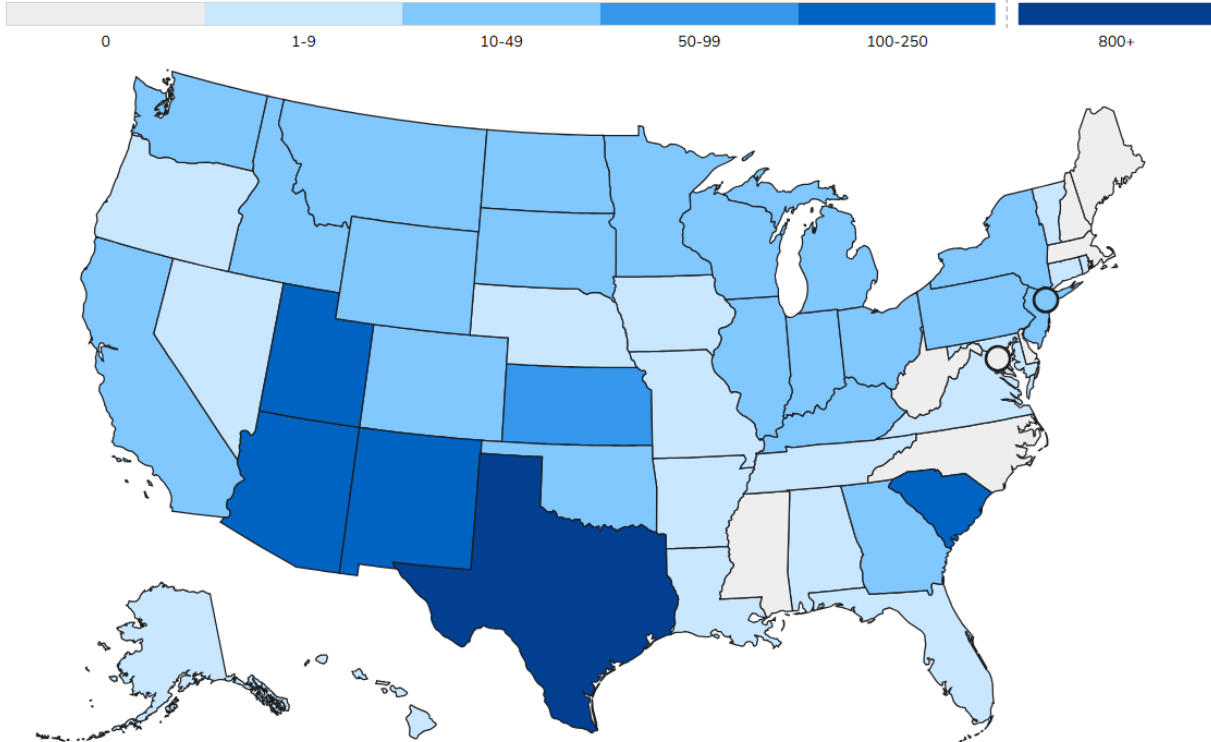




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2025 Case Map (As of December 30, 2025)

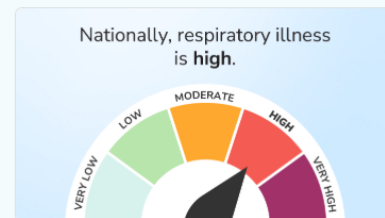


Federal Holiday Alert

Due to the New Year's holiday, the weekly respiratory illness data and summaries will not be updated on Friday, January 2, 2026. Data updates will resume on Monday, January 5, 2026.

WHAT TO KNOW

- As of December 30, 2025, the amount of acute respiratory illness causing people to seek health care is at a high level for the first time in the current 2025-2026 season.
- Seasonal influenza activity is elevated and continues to increase across the country.
- RSV activity is elevated in many areas of the country with emergency department visits and hospitalizations increasing among children 0-4 years old.
- COVID-19 activity is low but increasing nationally.

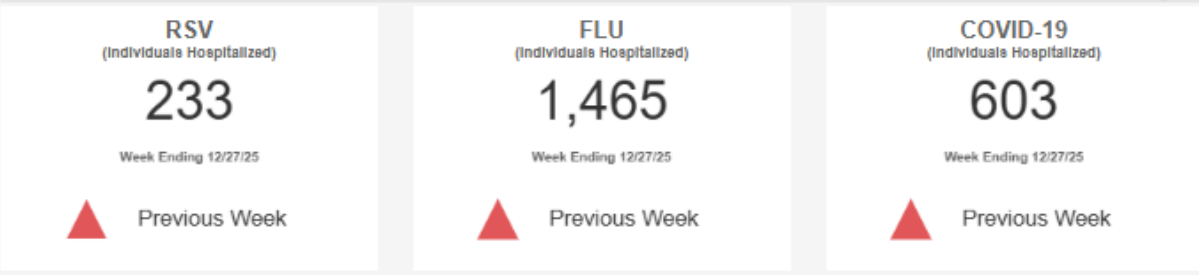

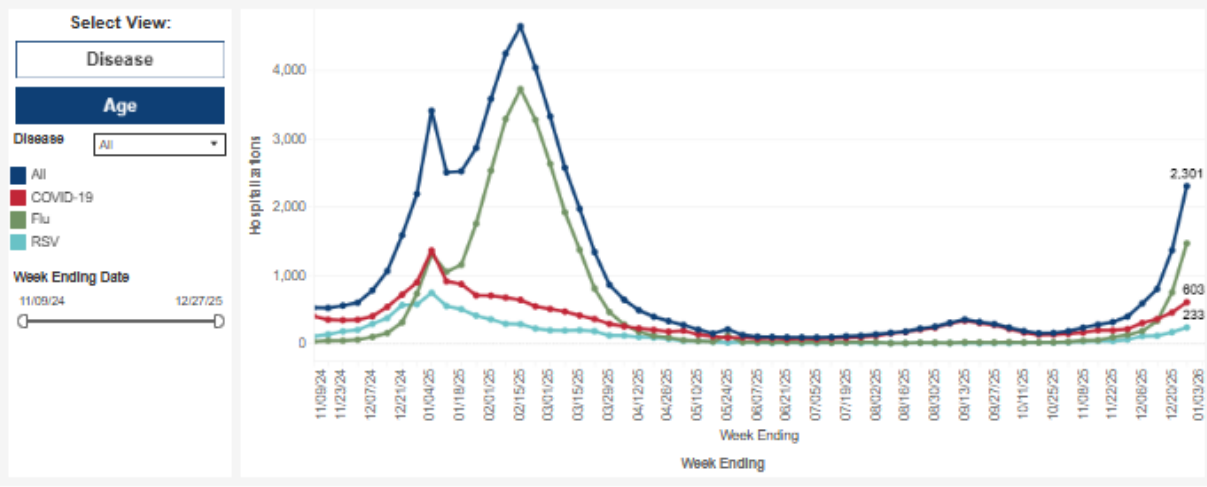
State of Ohio | Respiratory Activity

Summary Hospitalizations Outbreak Map

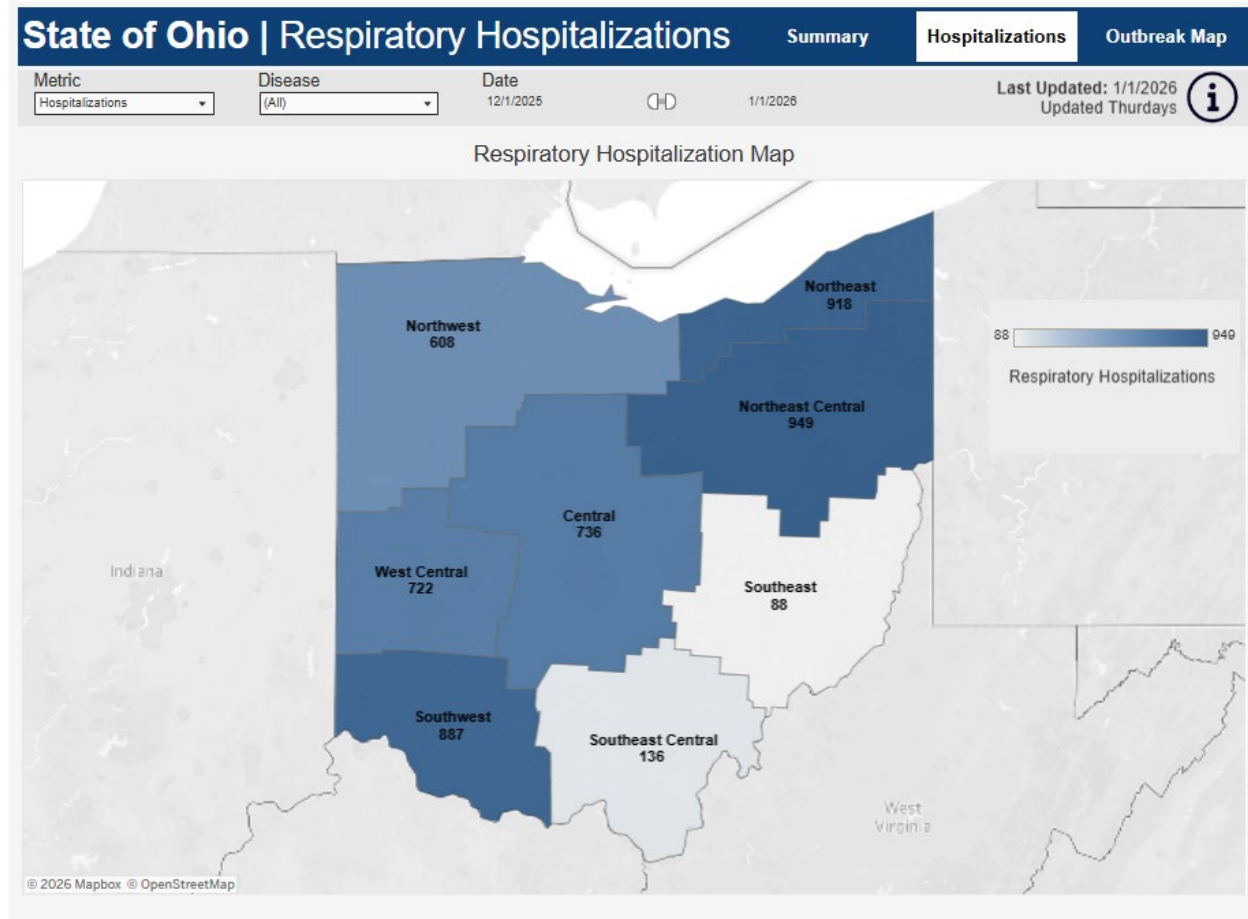

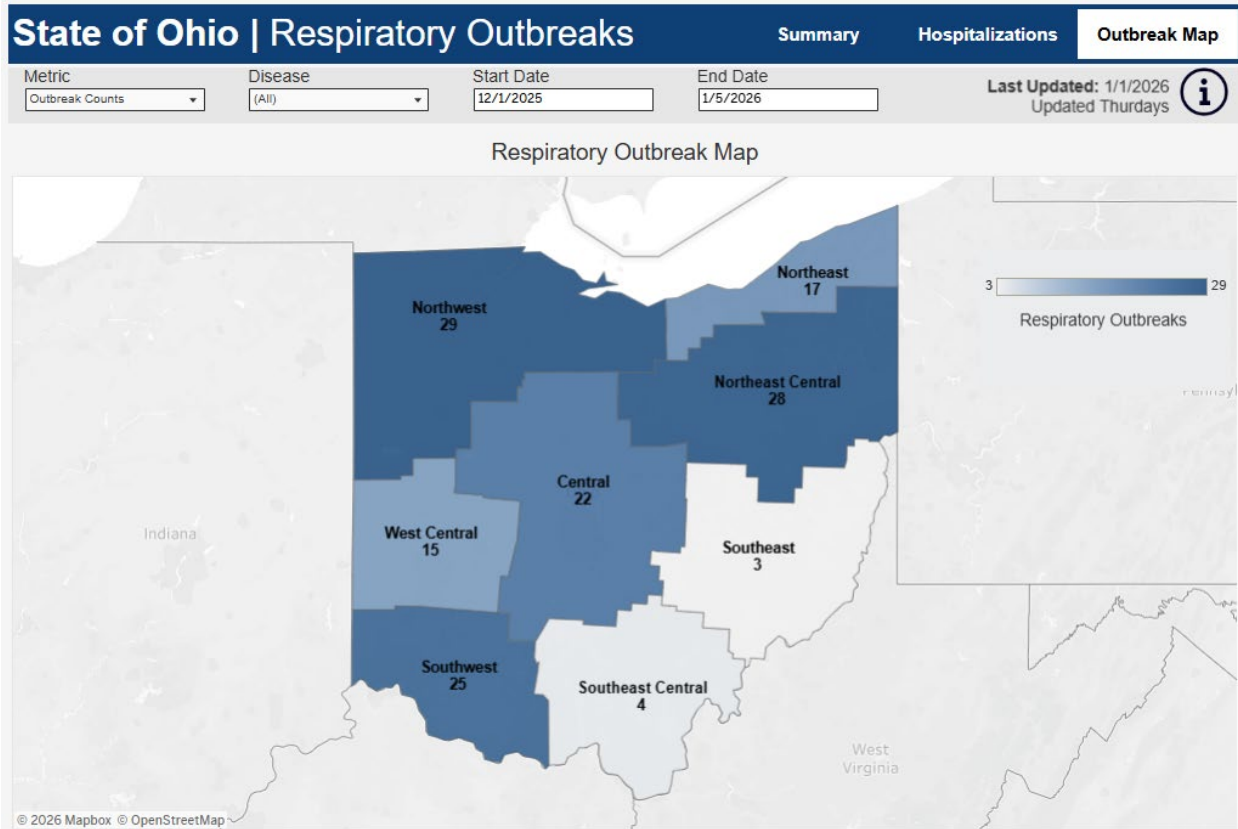

Respiratory Hospitalizations

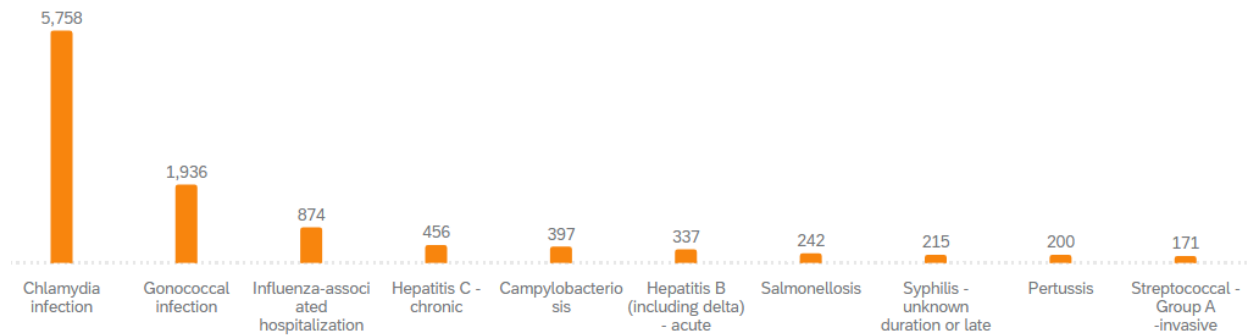

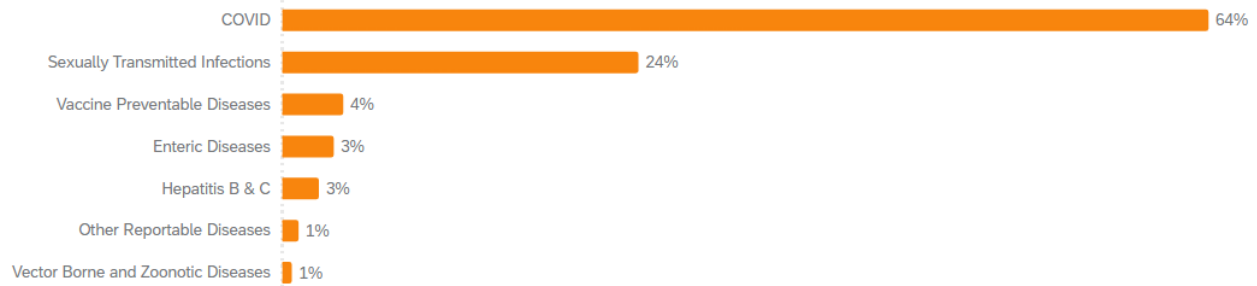
2025 FCPH Top 10 Reportable Conditions

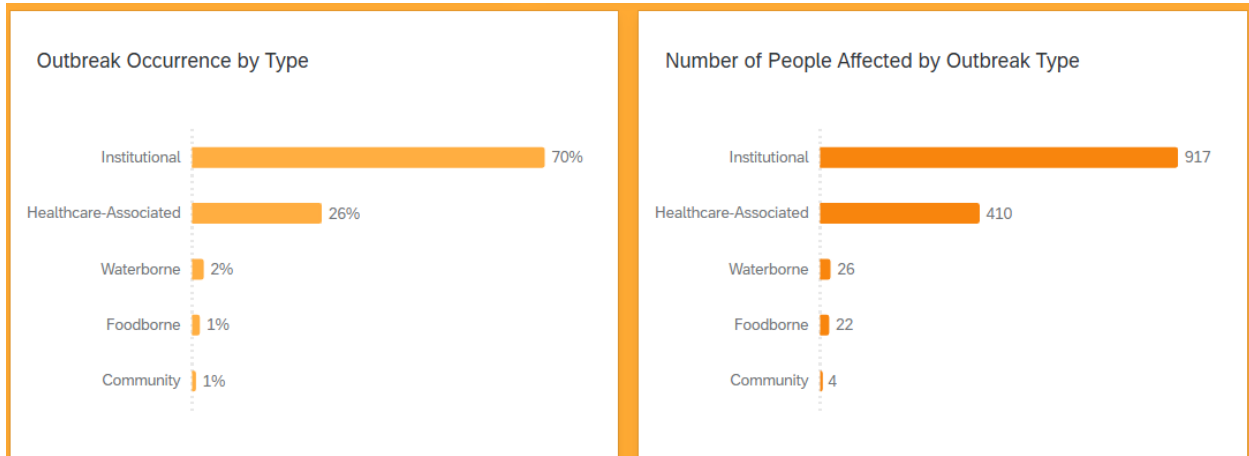
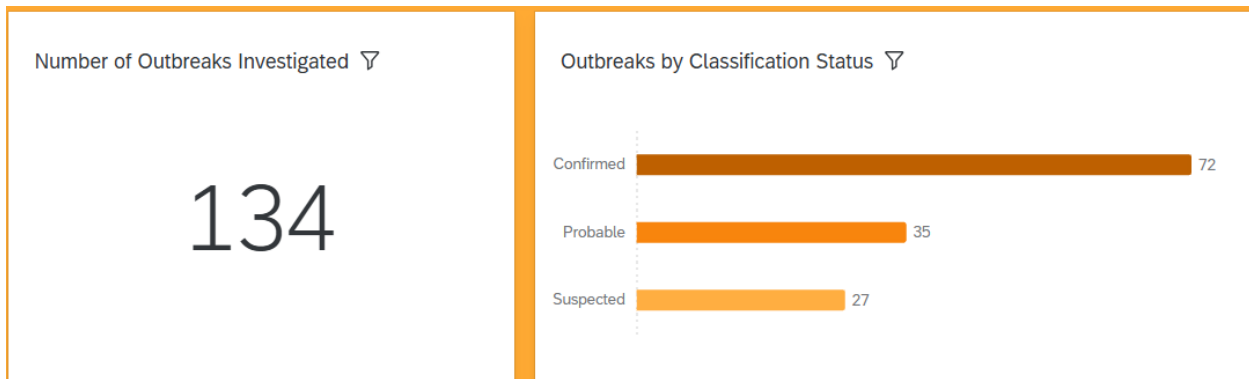


2025 FCPH Reportable Condition by Category

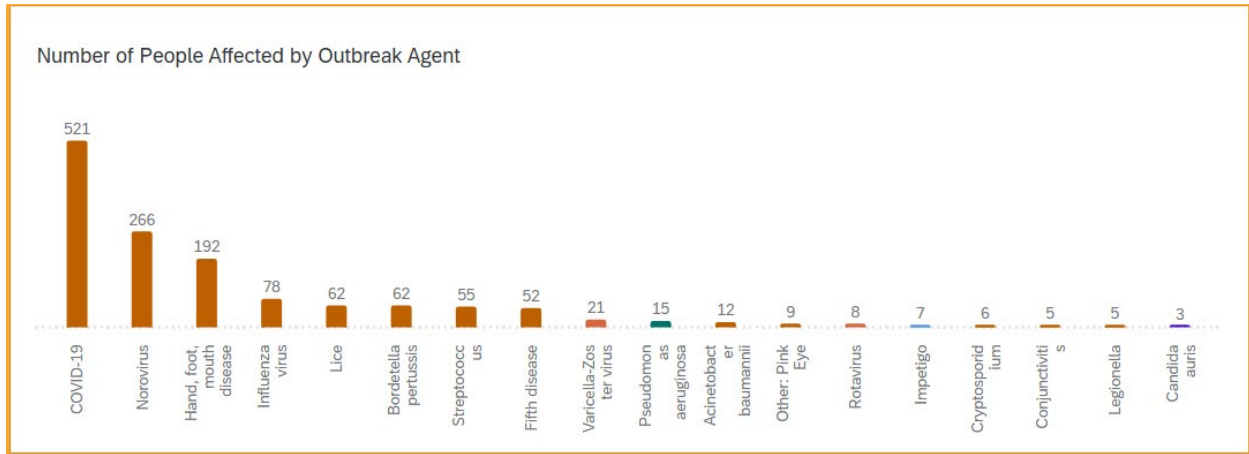
